



TRAINING

In 2024, the Crosslake Fire Department completed an impressive 3,420 hours of training, reflecting our unwavering dedication to maintaining the highest standards of readiness and safety. Our training program followed strict compliance with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards and the Minnesota Board of Firefighter Training and Education (MBFTE) guidelines. This ensures that our personnel remain well-prepared to face a wide range of emergency scenarios.

Training focused on several key areas, including structural and wildland firefighting, vehicle extrication, hazardous materials response, water and ice rescue, and emergency medical response. Specialized training sessions were also conducted for high-risk situations, such as confined space rescues and active shooter incidents, to ensure our team is equipped to handle complex and dynamic emergencies.

In addition to hands-on and scenario-based training, firefighters participated in classroom sessions to stay updated on the latest techniques, technologies, and safety protocols. Cross-departmental training exercises were organized in collaboration with neighboring fire departments, fostering teamwork and enhancing regional preparedness.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH AND EDUCATION

The Crosslake Fire Department was awarded a grant from the International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC) to host a Community Wildfire Prevention Day, focusing on wildfire education and engagement within the community. This initiative aims to increase awareness about the risks associated with the wildland-urban interface (WUI) and provided residents with practical tools and strategies to reduce those risks. This event was held on June 29 and include interactive demonstrations, information sessions on defensible space and fire-resistant landscaping, and resources for emergency preparedness. By involving community members, the program seeks to build stronger partnerships and promote shared responsibility for wildfire prevention and safety. The grant enables the department to bring critical resources and expertise to Crosslake, enhancing the overall resilience of the area.









COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The Crosslake Fire Department proudly hosted the Minnesota State Fire Chiefs Association (MSFCA) Region 5 Women's Expo on April 27, 2024. This landmark event brought together women from across the region to explore opportunities in the fire service and learn about the rewarding career paths it offers. The expo provided an interactive environment where attendees could engage with seasoned firefighters, participate in hands-on demonstrations, and gain insight into the unique challenges and triumphs of the fire industry.

The event aimed to create interest in firefighting among women and address the barriers that may discourage them from pursuing careers in the fire service. Through open discussions, mentorship opportunities, and skills-building activities, the expo worked to dispel misconceptions, build confidence, and encourage greater diversity in the fire industry. By hosting this event, the Crosslake Fire Department reinforced its commitment to fostering inclusivity and inspiring the next generation of firefighters.

GRANTS / DONATIONS RECEIVED

Sourcewell Community Match Fund Award: \$50,000.00

The Crosslake Fire Department is proud to announce the successful completion of a 30x40 cold storage building, funded in part by a \$50,000 Sourcewell matching grant. This new facility was designed to store seasonal equipment, such as rescue gear, outdoor tools, and other essential items, ensuring they are kept in excellent condition and ready for use when needed. The additional storage space has significantly enhanced the department's ability to maintain a clean, organized, and efficient main station.







International Association of Fire Chiefs: \$6,000.00

Funding to coordinate a local Community Wildfire Protection Plan - Community Day. This event aimed to increase awareness about the risks associated with the wildland-urban interface (WUI) and provided residents with practical tools and strategies to reduce those risks help educate the community about Wildland Urban Interface.

Sourcewell Boost Fund Award: \$2,000.00

The Sourcewell Boost Grant enabled the Fire Department to purchase two more pagers along with a multi-unit charger for our radios.





GRANTS / DONATIONS RECEIVED

MNDNR - Volunteer Fire Assistance Grant

The Crosslake Fire Department received a matching grant from the MNDNR in the amount of \$5,000. This grant helped fund mobile radios in our apparatus. The radios that were replaced were over ten years old.

Crosslake / Ideal Lions Club

The Crosslake Fire Department received a donation in the amount of \$6,000 from the Crosslake / Ideal Lions. This funding was used to purchase a slide in unit for our EMS/Command vehicle. This unit will hold equipment such as Fire Extinguishers, EMS Equipment, Air Monitoring Equipment, Personal Protection Equipment, SCBA, and Water Rescue Equipment.



MEMBERSHIP RETIREMENTS

Neil Luzar - Neil joined the Crosslake Fire Department in June of 2004. He was an active member for 20 years and 5 months. He served as Firefighter, Captain, and Assistant Fire Chief. Neil was very active in the community and conducted many fire and life safety education seminars during fire prevention week at the Crosslake Community School.
